A Catholic is obliged to confess serious sins in kind and number to a priest. If one is conscious of having committed serious sin, Confession ought to be made before receiving the Eucharist.

Baptism: Please call to arrange for your child's baptism before or soon after birth. A Godparent must be a Catholic in good standing.

Anointing of the Sick:

Please call for a priest to celebrate this Sacrament of Healing and Forgiveness for someone who is seriously ill or in danger of death. Do not wait until the sick person is unconscious.

Matrimony:

All Catholics ought to seek to have their marriage blessed by the Church so as to live in God's good graces & receive the Eucharist. Marriage cannot validly exist between baptized persons unless it is also a sacrament (Canon 1055.2). Contact a priest a year prior to the intended date of marriage to ensure proper preparation.

Confirmation: Need to complete your Sacraments of Initiation? Call Mrs. Kachnowski at 908-245-6572. She will help you prepare for confirmation. If they can do so without serious inconvenience, Catholics ought to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation before being admitted to marriage (Canon 1065).

RCIA: Desire baptism? Called to be a Catholic Christian? Contact Deacon David at 908-245-6572 and he will help you discern God's call to holiness.

“My Lord and my God, my Father! Into your hands I abandon the past, the present and the future, everything: little and big, great and small, temporal and eternal. (St. Josemaria, “The Way of the Cross,” Seventh Station, point 3, Prayer of Abandonment)

Today, my brothers & sisters, begins my second year at Assumption Church. Can you believe that? Time goes so fast. When I was told that I must apply for a new pastorate, I was upset. I had come to know my parishioners as family.

I visited Church of the Assumption which was looking for a new pastor, and Fr. Jim welcomed me so graciously. He showed me everything. The five hours we spent together seemed like a few minutes. While I hurt inside for leaving my family behind, Fr. Jim gave me hope for my new home. The parish secretary, Virginia, is an old acquaintance. She was our parish secretary at my first parish, Our Lady of Lourdes; what a small world, what a great blessing!

As I was moving things in, the first parishioners I met were Ben Farina and Deacon Dave. They immediately stepped up to help me carry my things upstairs. They are the image of a typical Assumption parishioner; always ready to help one another even their new pastor. My brothers and sisters, your hard work, love for the parish, and dedication are an inspiration to me.

I recall my second weekend. The welcoming party at the parish center were great. I spent most of the morning meeting my new parishioners and dodging doughnuts. It has been rumored that I did not thank them for their efforts in planning the welcoming, I am sorry that I did not, for in my heart I am very grateful. Like any man, I must consciously check my character defects at the door and be more gregarious. My primary concern is to please the parish, but personality can often get in the way.

I am sad that some in the parish have even found me very offensive and uncommunicative. They have even alerted the bishop. Of course, I was embarrassed by this and even hurt. Know that my door is always open. If ever you disagree with what I say or do, please don't hesitate to visit. I am willing to discuss it. Often it is a mere misunderstanding or there are extenuating circumstances. So, before we jump to letter writing or gossip, please meet with me. Jesus said, "For where two or more are gathered in my name, there am I."

In my homilies and columns, I sincerely reflect on the Word of God with the hope of bringing his message to be understood in a world that has denied Him. If I do slip into expressing my way and not Christ's Way, it is unintentional. Mea culpa. If I commit here- by, by all means notify the bishop, otherwise we can discuss it.

So I begin my second year with a sorry for having offended anyone in any way, and I offer my forgiveness to those who have mistrusted me or gossiped about me. Believe me, I am familiar with human weakness. When I was a child, my mother corrected me when someone criticized me and I was angry. "Paul," she said, "it is constructive criticism. They are only trying to help you be better."

Let's never forget we are family, brothers & sisters in Christ, and together we can only be Christ for others as long as we are Christ to one another and do his will first.

Thank you for being here for me. Thank you for your love and patience. *Ad multos annos.*

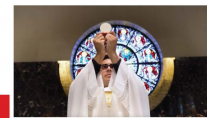

My dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

In recent weeks, the smoky haze arising from nearly 150 wildfires burning outside Quebec, Canada, coated much of the northeast of the United States including our four counties of northern New Jersey. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, this caused serious air quality issues here and as far south as northern Florida. In our part of the country, skies are darkening, and government officials are warning residents to stay inside and limit outdoor exposure as much as possible.

I am reminded of the prophetic warning of Pope Francis in his 2015 encyclical *Laudato Si'* (*On Care for Our Common Home*). In this letter, the Holy Father builds on the teaching of his predecessors (especially St. John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI) and calls for a conversion of mind and heart regarding our attitude toward the environment. He also challenges us to act in ways that are both eco-friendly and committed to resolving the problems of human society.

Laudato Si' is controversial. In many ways, it is a prophetic statement that is guaranteed to make everyone uncomfortable one way or another. "A true ecological approach always becomes a social approach," Pope Francis insists. "We must integrate questions of justice in debates on the environment, so as to hear both the cry of the Earth and the cry of the poor" (#49).

Although it is a prophetic statement with many challenges for us to consider, *Laudato Si'* is also a song of hope and joy inspired by the "Canticle of the Sun" written by St. Francis of Assisi as a hymn of praise to the Lord of all creation. "Praised be you, my Lord, with all your creatures, especially Sir Brother Sun, who is the day and through whom you give us light. And he is beautiful and radiant with great splendor; and bears a likeness to you, Most High" (#87). Our world is confronted with serious challenges—social, political, economic and environmental—that the pope tells us are, in reality, one crisis of "integral ecology" (#137)

"We are not God" (#67), the Holy Father says. The Earth that we inhabit does not belong to us; we belong to the Earth. As we are reminded vividly on Ash Wednesday, we are dust. We come from the dust of the Earth, and every one of us will return to dust one day. In the meantime, we are called to be stewards of all God's gifts, and this fundamental change of perspective from owner to steward changes everything.

The "dominion" over all creation that has been given to all humankind (cf. Genesis 1:28) is not to be exercised as a form of domination, but rather as an exercise of the kind of reverent care and nurturing cultivation and pruning that a sensitive gardener gives to his or her garden. "A fragile world, entrusted by God to human care, challenges us to devise intelligent ways of directing, developing and limiting our power" (#78), the pope tells us.

What can you and I do? We are called to conversion, to see with new eyes and an open heart. We're also challenged to act differently. How do we do this?

First, we have to see God's creation, our common home, differently. This requires prayer and meditation on the wonders of the world we have been given as stewards. Then we have to make decisions on issues that are not always clear, and that people of good will can disagree about. Finally, we have to act.

Here are a few of the things that Pope Francis hopes will be stimulated by his encyclical:

- Lifestyles that are simpler, healthier and less dependent on material resources.
- A new covenant between humanity and the environment based on responsible stewardship of all God's creation.
- A renewed sense of the sacredness of everyday things we use and too often take for granted.
- Substantive change in laws and social policies concerning the environment and care for the poor and most vulnerable members of our society.

As stewards of all God's creation, we have to change the way we live. We have to advocate for new laws and policies in our local, national and world communities that respond to both "the cry of the Earth" and "the cry of the poor." Change does not come easily to us. That's why *Laudato Si'* is a prophetic statement, as well as a hope-filled song of praise.
