A Catholic is obliged to confess serious sins in kind and number to a priest. If one is conscious of having committed serious sin, Confession ought to be made before receiving the Eucharist.

Baptism: Please call to arrange for your child's baptism before or soon after birth. A Godparent must be a Catholic in good standing.

Anointing of the Sick:

Please call for a priest to celebrate this Sacrament of Healing and Forgiveness for someone who is seriously ill or in danger of death. Do not wait until the sick person is unconscious.

Matrimony:

All Catholics ought to seek to have their marriage blessed by the Church so as to live in God's good graces & receive the Eucharist. Marriage cannot validly exist between baptized persons unless it is also a sacrament (Canon 1055.2). Contact a priest a year prior to the intended date of marriage to ensure proper preparation.

Confirmation: Need to complete your Sacraments of Initiation? Call Mrs. Kachnowski at 908-245-6572. She will help you prepare for confirmation. If they can do so without serious inconvenience, Catholics ought to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation before being admitted to marriage (Canon 1065).

RCIA: Desire baptism? Called to be a Catholic Christian? Contact Deacon David at 908-245-6572 and he will help you discern God's call to holiness.

It really works by blocking sites in your Wi-Fi server. Act now before your children see one more pornographic site or one more “social media” site promoting the LGBTQ+ propaganda.

But the seed sown on rich soil is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold.

My brothers and sisters, we are coming to a time in our Church history, when we are being challenged in our faith, even from within. For two thousand years, holy Mother Church has held up the highest morals, and the most stringent systematic theological teachings on Faith (from Sacraments to the nature of Christ). It is faith and morals that define a Catholic. What we believe and what we do must complement one another. We cannot say we have faith in Jesus Christ, and then condone or intentionally participate in unethical behavior and call ourselves good. Likewise, we cannot have solid morals for they will eventually break-down, if we do not have a confident and loving faith in Jesus Christ, who is the Divine Teacher (John 13:13).

In the parable of the seeds, we must strive to be the seed (faithful people striving to live a moral life) that is sown on rich soil (the genuine Church that proclaims the teachings of Christ crucified). Today we are living in a period when it is most difficult to hear Christ speak. So many, even those in the Church, send out mixed messages. Does loving others mean we consent to their vices? Does obedience to our pastors mean we accept everything they say, even when it is apparently contrary to what we have known to be true? From top to bottom and left to right, the world appears upside down and this cannot not have an effect on the Church for she exists in this world and her people live amongst the many in the world who do not believe and often have hatred or indifference toward Christ's Church.

I have met Catholics who have condoned sin. Yes, we are sinners, but to condone such behavior or even reclassify it as not sin or redefine it as a good, is the height of human arrogance. Our God has revealed to us what is sin. Through out the Bible, early teachings of the Church and subsequent theology, we have grown to understand with the help of divine Revelation, common sense, science and reason, what is good and what is evil. Never has it happened nor should it happen that the Church has taken a former evil and redefined it as a good (e.g., abortion, homosexual acts, embezzlement, pedophilia). On the contrary, we have often come to the realization that what was formerly seen as a good or an acceptable act is actually an evil, e.g., human sacrifice, slavery, unjust war.

The seed is sown, but whether or not it thrives depends on the support it receives. We as Catholics must support one another in faith and morals. We must encourage each other to be faithful to Christ and his Church regardless of the mixed messages we receive from weak leadership. And in a world that wants freedom to imply licentiousness, we must be there to encourage sound morality where the soil is thin, the sun is hot, and thorns are abundant. If we are not there as Christ's instruments, then we and others will be choked out, withered and left to perish. But if we plant ourselves firmly on sound doctrine and fidelity to a moral way of living ala Jesus Christ, we can weather the storm of earthly torments and achieve the peace of Christ's heavenly kingdom.

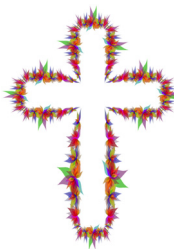

The long board meeting is over. A general approval awaits the CEO's decision. The production team is geared up. Right then the CEO turns to her Vice-President for communications and says: "Charlie, get the word out!" With that comes a flood of TV commercials, online ads, signs on buses and trains, not to omit printed come-ons for consumers. That scenario is common in the business world: A pattern laid out for the company's positive bottom line.

Our Lord, who by His own admission is the Word, needs to get His message out to the world, needing no more than loving and dedicated disciples like us. He began with His Chosen Twelve and then moved on to the great St. Paul. There followed a long line of preachers and teachers worthy of sainthood, right up to you and me.

The Holy Spirit lets us in on a masterful presentation that Jesus makes through a farming parable all about seeds and sowing. He does it under a smiling sun in the great outdoors, which He seems to prefer to an enclosed academic setting. His rural audience is entranced as He speaks.

In response to His apostles' query, Jesus explains to them (and us) that the various soils represent the kinds of response the Word generates among people. From faith-filled conviction all the way to apathetic yawning.

There is a story of the poet Samuel Coleridge, who one day listened to a visitor's vehement argument against the religious education of the young. His acquaintance had concluded with a statement of his determination not to prejudice his children toward any faith or religion, but to let them make up their own minds when they reached maturity.

Coleridge made no immediate comment, but shortly afterward asked his visitor if he would like to see his garden, and then led him to a strip of lawn that was overgrown with weeds. "Why, this is no garden. It's nothing but a weed patch, said his guest. "Oh," replied Coleridge, "that's because it hasn't come to maturity yet. The weeds, you see, have taken the opportunity to grow, and I thought it would be unfair of me to prejudice the soil toward roses and strawberries."

God love you and give you His guidance on getting the Word out.

The Annual Missionary Co-Operative Plan Visitation July 15-16, 2023

To stop the chaos, the Archdiocese allows one missionary order to visit one parish each summer.

Today we welcome **FR. SLEEVA RAJU KALA, OSF**. He is preaching at every Mass on behalf of The Oblates of St. Francis de Sales.

You should have received a SPECIAL OFFERING envelope entitled: **MISSIONARY CO-OPERATIVE PLAN COLLECTION**. Feel free to make any donation you would like on that Sunday. The envelopes are undated since we do not know the date of the visit until after the envelopes are printed.

The Oblates of St. Francis is a religious order of men who were founded in 1876 and have spread the optimistic spirituality of St. Francis de Sales. They serve some of the poorest people in the world as parish priests, ministers, educators, and social workers. Each year they invite parishes around the United States to share the needs of the worldwide Church, to request the support of prayer and to receive financial assistance for the needs of their missions. They thank you for sharing in the command of Jesus to "go out into the whole world and preach the Gospel to all creation."

The Word's Return

Jesus is portrayed in the Gospel (Mt 11:25-30) as a new and greater Moses. Moses, the meekest man on earth (see Numbers 12:3), was God's friend (see Exodus 34:12, 17). Only he knew God "face to face" (see Deuteronomy 34:10). And Moses gave Israel the yoke of the Law, through which God first revealed Himself and how we are to live (see Jeremiah 2:20; 5:5).

Jesus, too, is meek and humble. But He is more than God's friend. He is the Son who alone knows the Father. He is more also than a law-giver, presenting Himself as the yoke of a new Law and as the revealed Wisdom of God.

As Wisdom, Jesus was present before creation as the firstborn of God, the Father and Lord of heaven and earth (see Proverbs 8:22; Wisdom 9:9). And He gives knowledge of the holy things of the kingdom of God (see Wisdom 10:10).

In the gracious will of the Father, Jesus reveals these things only to the "childlike"—those who humble themselves before Him as little children (see Sirach 2:17). These alone can recognize and receive Jesus as the just savior and meek king promised to daughter Zion, Israel.

We, too, are called to childlike faith in the Father's goodness as sons and daughters of the new kingdom, the Church. We are to live by the Spirit we received in Baptism (see Galatians 5:16), putting to death our old ways of thinking and acting, as Paul exhorts in his Epistle to the Romans. Our "yoke" is to be His new law of love (see John 13:34), by which we enter into the "rest" of His kingdom.

As we sing in Psalm 145, we joyously await the day when we will praise His name forever in the kingdom that lasts for all ages. This is the sabbath rest promised by Jesus—the rest first anticipated by Moses (see Exodus 20:8-11), but which still awaits the people of God (see Hebrews 4:9).

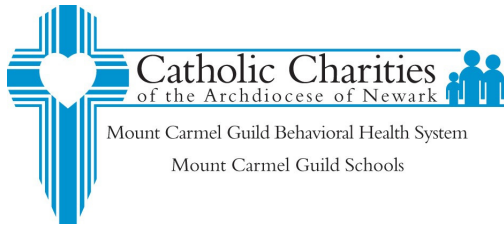

Saint Camillus of Lellis, Italian San Camillo De Lellis, (born May 25, 1550, Bucchianico, Kingdom of Naples [now in Italy]—died July 14, 1614, Rome; canonized 1746; feast day July 14), founder of the Ministers of the Sick. Along with St. John of God, Camillus became patron of the sick.

The son of an impoverished nobleman, Camillo became a soldier of fortune and an inveterate gambler. In 1575 he was converted and became a servant and later an assistant at St. James's Hospital for incurables in Rome, where he had been a patient with an ulcerated leg and rupture that impeded him his whole life. Camillo was ordained in 1584, and in 1586 he obtained approval for the congregation of priests he had founded, devoted to hospital service. There originally were 12 members, without vows, working in the Hospital of the Holy Spirit in Naples, but in 1591 Pope Gregory XIV approved their becoming a religious order called Ministers of the Sick, wearing a red cross on the cassock. By the time of Camillo's death there were nearly 300 members. Camillo was general of the order until 1607. He insisted on the utmost care for both the soul and the body of his patients. Though his own health worsened, he exhausted himself for charity.
