A Catholic is obliged to confess <u>serious sins</u> in kind and number to a priest. If one is conscious of having committed serious sin, Confession ought to be made before receiving the Eucharist.

<u>Baptism:</u> Please call to arrange for your child's baptism before or soon after birth. A Godparent must be a Catholic in good standing.

Anointing of the Sick:

Please call for a priest to celebrate this Sacrament of Healing and Forgiveness for someone who is seriously ill or in danger of death. <u>Do not</u> wait until the sick person is unconscious.

Matrimony:

All Catholics ought to seek to have their marriage blessed by the Church so as to live in God's good graces & receive the Eucharist. Marriage cannot validly exist between baptized persons unless it is also a sacrament (Canon 1055.2). Contact a priest about a year prior to the intended date of marriage to ensure proper preparation.

<u>Confirmation</u>: Need to complete your Sacraments of Initiation? Call Mrs. Kachnowski at 908-245-6572. She will help you prepare for confirmation. If they can do so without serious inconvenience, Catholics ought to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation before being admitted to marriage (Canon 1065).

<u>RCIA</u>: Desire baptism? Called to be a Catholic Christian? Contact Deacon David at 908-245-6572 and he will help you discern God's call to holiness.

"I, John, saw a new heavens and a new earth" (Rev. 21:1)

As we approach this new year, we wonder how it will turn out. Will there be sorrow or joy, prosperity or hard times, peace or war, more sickness or health? This uncertainty about the future gives rise to anxiety or even angst. Hopelessness and despair want to be our friends. But our Lord always wanted us to live lives in God's own peace; something that is beyond our understanding but keeps guard over our hearts and minds (see Phil 4:7). And so He asks us to pray, presenting to him our needs and being thankful.

Life can be a great burden and without our faith behind us we would be crushed by its weight. Even though atheists dismiss our religion and faith in God as myth and fantasy, they create for themselves a mythos to help them cope with the fear of dying and of the burdens of life, for no man can stand to face his non-existence and remain sane. Our faith in Christ sustains us. We recognize him as the source of the universe and our Creator, for it was through Him that we were created and by Him redeemed.

We have what non-believers lack, and that is hope: the second theological virtue. It is hope that helps us face the next day with love and a cheerful heart. It is hope that keeps us in joyful anticipation of the coming of Christ who will establish the new heavens and new earth, which St. John saw in the vision at Patmos. The Day of the Lord will come. Hope is what we hold onto when we face the dying of a loved one, the ravages of war, and the disappointments that hit us everyday of our lives. And when it comes time for ourselves to die, we keep hope that tomorrow we will be with Christ in Paradise.

So the year of Our Lord 2024 has its uncertainties, but in the virtue of hope we trust that Christ will be with us every step of the way, in the good times and especially in the bad where He carries us safely into his most Sacred Heart, the sanctuary of those who love Him, put their faith in Him, and continually keep hope in Him.

In the sure and certain hope that Christ is the king of the ages, may God bless you and your family this coming year. And whatever sadness or joy comes your way, present your needs to Him in full gratitude for He has given us the hope that this day is not the end but only the beginning of a more beautiful and joyous Day to come.



How parishes ae supported throughout the world.

In many European countries, nations like Italy and Germany directly tax their citizen for the church. For instance, in Germany you either check Evangelischer (Lutheran) or Katolischer and automatically your salary is taxed for your church.

In the Philippines, the church was supported by Spain for 400 years and then by the missions. Today the Philippine parish more and more has to support itself like here.

Here in the US, the parishioner is directly responsible for support his/her parish church and even the diocese. Without your support, it will not continue financially well.



Qualified Charitable Distributions

If you are retired and are taking distributions from your traditional IRA, these distributions are considered to be <u>taxable income</u> according to the IRS and you will owe taxes on the total amount you withdraw. <u>However</u>, you can reduce your taxable income by making a charitable distribution directly from your IRA to our parish. For example, if you are taking a \$1,000 distribution and you wish to make a \$500 donation, and you are in the 20% tax bracket, your tax liability will be reduced by \$100. HERE IS HOW IT WORKS: EVERY THURSDAY EVENING BETWEEN 6:30 AND 7:00 PM THERE IS A VOLUNTEER AT THE ANNEX (THE TWO GARAGES FACING COOLIDGE PLACE) COLLECTING SANDWICHES THAT WILL BE DELIVERED TO ST. JOSEPH'S.

GUIDELINES FOR SANDWICHES: SANDWICHES CAN BE MADE WITH MEAT (2 SLICES) AND CHEESE (1 SLICE) OR PEANUT BUTTER AND JELLY. NOTHING WITH MAYO, CONDIMENTS, LETTUCE, OR TOMA-TO.

SANDWICHES MUST BE INDIVIDUALLY WRAPPED IN PLAS-TIC SANDWICH BAGS (NO ALUMINUM FOIL) AND INSERTED BACK IN THE BREAD BAG.

ONE LOAF OF BREAD TYPICALLY IS ENOUGH FOR 10 SAND-

Saint Lucy of Syracuse, Virgin and Martyr († 303)

Saint Lucy was a young Christian maiden of Syracuse, Sicily. She had already offered her virginity to God and refused to marry. Her mother pressed her to accept the offer of a young pagan. The mother was afflicted afterwards for several years by an issue of blood, and all human remedies were ineffectual. Lucy reminded her mother that a woman in the Gospel, suffering from the same disorder, had been healed by the divine power. They made a journey to Catania, Sicily, where the tomb of Saint Agatha, martyred in 251, was already a site of pilgrimage. "St. Agatha," Lucy said, "stands ever in the sight of Him for whom she died. Only touch her sepulcher with faith, and you will be healed."

Saint Lucy and her mother spent the night praying by the tomb, until both fell asleep. Saint Agatha appeared in vision to Saint Lucy, and foretold her mother's recovery and Lucy's future martyrdom: You will soon be the glory of Syracuse, as I am of Catania. At that instant the cure was effected; and in her gratitude the mother allowed her daughter to distribute her wealth among the poor, and to conserve her virginity.

The young man who had sought her hand in marriage denounced her as a Christian during the persecution of Diocletian, but Our Lord saved this virgin. The prefect gave orders to attach her by cords to harnessed bulls, but the bulls did not succeed. Prefect said, "How can you, a feeble woman, triumph over a thousand men?" She replied, "Bring ten thousand, and they will not be able to combat against God!" A fire did her no harm, though she was covered with resin and oil. When a sword was plunged into her heart, the promise made at the tomb of Saint Agatha was fulfilled. Saint Lucy died, predicting peace for the Church.

From a pastoral letter by Saint Charles Borromeo, Archbishop of Milan from 1564 to 1584

(Acta Ecclesiae Mediolanensis, t. 2, Lugduni, 1683, 916-917)

The season of Advent

Beloved, now is the acceptable time spoken of by the Spirit, the day of salvation, peace and reconciliation: the great season of Advent. This is the time eagerly awaited by the patriarchs and prophets, the time that holy Simeon rejoiced at last to see. This is the season that the Church has always celebrated with special solemnity. We too should always observe it with faith and love, offering praise and thanksgiving to the Father for the mercy and love he has shown us in this mystery. In his infinite love for us, though we were sinners, he sent his only Son to free us from the tyranny of Satan, to summon us to heaven, to welcome us into its innermost recesses, to show us truth itself, to train us in right conduct, to plant within us the seeds of virtue, to enrich us with the treasures of his grace, and to make us children of God and heirs of eternal life.

Each year, as the Church recalls this mystery, she urges us to renew the memory of the great love God has shown us. This holy season teaches us that Christ's coming was not only for the benefit of his contemporaries; his power has still to be communicated to us all. We shall share his power, if, through holy faith and the sacraments, we willingly accept the grace Christ earned for us, and live by that grace and in obedience to Christ.

The Church asks us to understand that Christ, who came once in the flesh, is prepared to come again. When we remove all obstacles to his presence he will come, at any hour and moment, to dwell spiritually in our hearts, bringing with him the riches of his grace.

In her concern for our salvation, our loving mother the Church uses this holy season to teach us through hymns, canticles and other forms of expression, of voice or ritual, used by the Holy Spirit. She shows us how grateful we should be for so great a blessing, and how to gain its benefit: our hearts should be as much prepared for the coming of Christ as if he were still to come into this world. The same lesson is given us for our imitation by the words and example of the holy men of the Old Testament.
