A Catholic is obliged to confess <u>serious sins</u> in kind and number to a priest. If one is conscious of having committed serious sin, Confession ought to be made before receiving the Eucharist.

<u>Baptism:</u> Please call to arrange for your child's baptism before or soon after birth. A Godparent must be a Catholic in good standing.

Anointing of the Sick:

Please call for a priest to celebrate this Sacrament of Healing and Forgiveness for someone who is seriously ill or in danger of death. <u>Do not</u> wait until the sick person is unconscious.

Matrimony:

All Catholics ought to seek to have their marriage blessed by the Church so as to live in God's good graces & receive the Eucharist. Marriage cannot validly exist between baptized persons unless it is also a sacrament (Canon 1055.2). Contact a priest about a year prior to the intended date of marriage to ensure proper preparation.

Confirmation: Need to complete your Sacraments of Initiation? Call Mrs. Kachnowski at 908-245-6572. She will help you prepare for confirmation. If they can do so without serious inconvenience, Catholics ought to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation before being admitted to marriage (Canon 1065).

RCIA: Desire baptism? Called to be a Catholic Christian? Contact Deacon David at 908-245-6572 and he will help you discern God's call to holiness.

Repent, and believe in the gospel. (Mark 1:14)

These words are the essence of the Gospel = the Good News. Gospel comes from the old English god (good) spell (message). In Latin the word is Evangelium which is from the Greek Ευαγγέλιο meaning the good message/news. This passage begs the question: What is the gospel? We can look at the high theology in the Gospel according to St. John: In the beginning was the Word...and the world was made through him; God so loved the world he sent his only Son; the Word became flesh and dwelt among us; of his fullness we all had a share; God's enduring love came through Jesus Christ; Jesus, the Bread of God, comes down from heaven and gives life; Unless you eat my body and drink my blood you will not have life within you. So here we hear of the goodness of the Lord Jesus. His message of love, sacrifice and eternal life is the good news. Yet as we hear in in the Gospel according to St. Mark, belief in the good news has a simple yet profound prerequisite - REPENT-ANCE. With out turning away from the sinfulness of our past lives we cannot be immersed in the promises of the Gospel. Remember the repentant thief on the cross? He recognized his sins, repented and Christ promised him Paradise that day!

Unfortunately, these days, many believe that we can persist in the lure of our sins, abstain from the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, and still say we believe in the Gospel. While we are all sinners in the hands of loving God, we must repent and confess our serious offenses. Some sins are habitual and require daily repentance. It is a struggle, but with a little endurance and trust in Jesus, we can avoid sin, repent and grow ever closer to a virtuous life. But what is most important is that we reject sin and respect the Church's definition of what is sin. To assume that we, either as individuals or as lobbies, define what is sin and what is not is itself a grave sin.

I have noticed that the general population sees today only a handful of acts as serious sins (e.g. murder (not of the unborn), abuse of children/ minors (though NAMBLA considers it a good), rape, grand larceny, war, suicide (but not euthanasia)), otherwise most everything else is permissible to one degree or another. Yet we Catholics have a long list of vices and expect that those who accept the Gospel to practice virtue & believe. We must repent of the vices, sins, unbelief and improprieties. We must then believe in the Gospel by living in the hope of eternal life granted to those who love as Jesus loves. As he said, "There is no greater love than to lay one's life down for a friend." Jesus did this for us, so that we can be free of sin, and live as one with Him.

Saint Vincent of Saragossa, Deacon and Martyr († 304)

Saint Vincent was archdeacon of the church at Saragossa, Spain. Valerian, the bishop, was prevented from preaching by a speech impediment, and named Vincent to preach in his stead. He answered in the bishop's name when, during the persecution of Diocletian, both were brought before Dacian, the presiding officer. When the bishop was sent into banishment, Vincent was retained, to suffer and to die.

First he was stretched on the rack; and when he was almost torn asunder, Dacian asked him in mockery how he fared now. Vincent answered, with joy on his countenance, that he had always prayed to be as he was then. It was in vain that Dacian struck the executioners and goaded them on in their savage work. The martyr's flesh was torn with hooks; he was bound to a chair of red-hot iron; lard and salt were rubbed into his wounds; and amid all this he kept his eyes raised to heaven, and remained unmoved.

The holy martyr was cast into a solitary dungeon, his feet placed in the stocks; but the Angels of Christ illuminated the darkness, and assured Vincent that he was near his triumph. His wounds were now ordered to be tended, to prepare him for fresh torments, and the faithful were permitted to gaze on his mangled body. They came in troops, kissed his wounds and carried away as relics, cloths colored with his blood. Before the tortures could resume, Saint Vincent's hour came, and he breathed forth his soul in peace.

Even the dead bodies of the Saints are precious in the sight of God, and the hand of iniquity cannot touch them. A raven guarded the body of Vincent where it lay flung upon the earth. When it was sunk out at sea, the waves cast it ashore; and his relics are preserved to this day in the Augustinian monastery at Lisbon, for the consolation of the Church of Christ.

Reflection. Do you wish to be at peace amid suffering and temptation? Then make it your principal endeavor to grow in habits of prayer and in union with Christ. Have confidence in Him. He will make you victorious over your spiritual enemies and over yourself. He will enlighten your darkness and sweeten your sufferings, and in your solitude and desolation He will draw near to you with His holy Angels.

ADDICTION TREATMENT REFERRAL PROGRAM for persons suffering from acute addiction

Within 48 hours of receipt of referral, NJRC will provide linkage to and commencement of addiction treatment services to referred persons. These services will include but are not limited to linkages for intake, the creation of a personalized long-term treatment plan, detoxification, ambulatory withdrawal management, induction on Suboxone or buprenorphine or the initiation of Vivitrol, residential treatment, intensive outpatient treatment, and/or induction of Medication Assisted Treatment, as needed and appropriate. Where appropriate, court-involved persons and justice-involved veterans will also be enrolled and referred to NJRC's Orientation and additional wrap-around services, including job training and employment, mental health and medical care, transportation, and license restoration services.

Tithing v. Contributing

Although the Church teaches that offering some form of material support to the Church is obligatory for all Catholic adults who are able to do so, it doesn't specify what percent of one's income should be given. Remember, tithing was an Old Testament obligation that was incumbent on the Jews under the Law of Moses. Christians are dispensed from the obligation of tithing ten percent of their incomes, but not from the obligation to contribute to their parish and the Church.

The key to understanding how God wants us to give to the Church is found in 1 Corinthians 16:2, "On the first day of the week each of you should set aside whatever he can afford," and in 2 Corinthians 9:5-8,

So I thought it necessary to encourage the brethren to go on ahead to you and arrange in advance for your promised gift, so that in this way it might be ready as a bountiful gift and not as an exaction. Consider this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each must do as already determined without sadness or compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. Moreover, God is able to make every grace abundant for you, so that in all things, always having all you need, you may have an abundance for every good work.

To paraphrase: God doesn't demand a fixed amount of money from us; he wants us to give from the heart. If people are forced by their church to give a certain percent of their income, that's extortion. If they give freely and cheerfully the amount they are able, that's a gift.

Weekly Contribution

How much you give is up to you. We only ask that you contribute with deliberation and prayer. It ought not be a last-minute decision. It is a contribution of support, not a donation. Together with your family, consider how much you can give each week to the upkeep of your parish. The parish runs solely on the contributions of her parishioners. Neither the government nor the Archdiocese financially support the parish. In fact, the parish gives an assessment (15%) of this ordinary income to the Archdiocese of Newark, of which we are a part and are obliged to support. Please use your weekly offering envelopes. It demonstrates that you are an active and faithful member of this parish.

Monthly Maintenance & Repair Contribution

We also have a **Maintenance Collection**. Each month we are permitted to take up a collection for maintenance. This collection is <u>not</u> assessed by the Archdiocese and so every cent that you give in this collection remains in the parish---it is a designated or restricted revenue. It happens often that someone places a large contribution into the weekly collection which is assessed at 15%. This skews the annual collection which affects our AAA Goal and the amount at which we are assessed. It would be advantageous to the parish if such extraordinary gifts be designated or placed in the maintenance collection. Please use your white maintenance envelopes for this.

Monthly Donation to Various Charities

Each month we take up a national collection for various charities that are supported by the Archdiocese. This is a purely voluntary collection which goes directly to the designated charity. You've received a colored envelope along with your other envelopes for this purpose. Please use them; there will not be a second passing of the basket for this.

Special Gifts

Sometimes you are inclined to give a special gift to the parish either directly or in your will. It may be either Restricted or Unrestricted. Unrestricted means that the pastor can use these monies for whatever purpose the parish needs. It is assessed at 15% as ordinary income. So if you give \$1000, \$150 will rightly go to the Archdiocese.

A restricted gift, whether given directly or in a will, is designated for a particular purpose, like maintenance, religious education, a new sidewalk, painting of the church, etc. Since this gift is designated, it is not assessed. So if you were to give \$1000 to replace a door or buy a Paschal Candle, the full \$1000 is available to the parish for that purpose.
