A Catholic is obliged to confess serious sins in kind and number to a priest. If one is conscious of having committed serious sin, Confession ought to be made before receiving the Eucharist.

Baptism: Please call to arrange for your child's baptism before or soon after birth. A Godparent must be a Catholic in good standing.

Anointing of the Sick:

Please call for a priest to celebrate this Sacrament of Healing and Forgiveness for someone who is seriously ill or in danger of death. Do not wait until the sick person is unconscious.

Matrimony:

All Catholics ought to seek to have their marriage blessed by the Church so as to live in God's good graces & receive the Eucharist. Marriage cannot validly exist between baptized persons unless it is also a sacrament (Canon 1055.2). Contact a priest a year prior to the intended date of marriage to ensure proper preparation.

Confirmation: Need to complete your Sacraments of Initiation? Call Mrs. Kachnowski at 908-245-6572. She will help you prepare for confirmation. If they can do so without serious inconvenience, Catholics ought to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation before being admitted to marriage (Canon 1065).

RCIA: Desire baptism? Called to be a Catholic Christian? Contact Deacon David at 908-245-6572 and he will help you discern God's call to holiness.

How is Someone Canonized a Saint?

"To begin a cause of sainthood it is necessary for at least 5 years to have passed since the death of the candidate. This is to allow greater balance and objectivity in evaluating the case and to let the emotions of the moment dissipate."

"The bishop of the diocese in which the person, whose beatification is sought, died is responsible for beginning the investigation. The promoter group ('Actor Causae'), either a diocese, parish, religious congregation, or association, asks the bishop through the postulator for the opening of the investigation. The bishop forms a diocesan tribunal for this purpose. Witnesses are called before the tribunal to recount concrete facts on the exercise of Christian virtues considered heroic, that is, the theological virtues: faith, hope and charity, and the cardinal virtues: prudence, justice, temperance and fortitude, and others specific to his state in life. In addition, all documents regarding the candidate must be gathered. At this point he is entitled to the title of Servant of God or Venerable..

"Once the diocesan investigation is finished, the acts and documentation are passed on to the Congregation for the Causes of Saints. The public copy used for further work is put together here. The postulator, resident in Rome, follows the preparation of the 'Positio', or summary of the documentation that proves the heroic exercise of virtue, under the direction of a relator of the Congregation. The 'Positio' undergoes an examination by nine theologians who give their vote. If the majority of the theologians are in favor, the cause is passed on for examination by cardinals and bishops who are members of the congregation. They hold meetings twice a month. If their judgment is favorable, the prefect of the congregation presents the results of the entire course of the cause to the Holy Father, who gives his approval and authorizes the congregation to draft the relative decree. The public reading and promulgation of the decree follows.

"For the beatification of a confessor a miracle attributed to the Servant of God, verified after his death, is necessary. The required miracle must be proven through the appropriate canonical investigation, following a procedure analogous to that for heroic virtues. This one too is concluded with the relative decree. Once the two decrees are promulgated (regarding the heroic virtues and the miracle) the Holy Father decides on beatification, which is the concession of public worship, limited to a particular sphere. With beatification the candidate receives the title of Blessed.

"For canonization another miracle is needed, attributed to the intercession of the Blessed and having occurred after his beatification. The methods for ascertainment of the affirmed miracle are the same as those followed for beatification. Canonization is understood as the concession of public worship in the Universal Church. Pontifical infallibility is involved. With canonization, the Blessed acquires the title of Saint."

SAINT CATHERINE OF SIENA, VIRGIN (1347-1380)

Catherine, the daughter of a humble Christian tradesman, was raised up to be the guide and guardian of the Church in one of the darkest periods of its history, the fourteenth century. As a child, prayer was her delight. She would say the Hail Mary on each step as she mounted the stairs, and was granted in reward a vision of Christ in glory. And He revealed to her the secrets of Christian perfection. When

only seven years old she made a vow of virginity, afterwards enduring bitter persecution for refusing to marry.

Her parents persisted long in their refusal to allow her to enter religious life, her only ambition; but she made a kind of spiritual and penitential convent cell in her heart's depths, and there she found her Beloved and conversed with Him each day. At the age of fifteen she was permitted to enter the Third Order of Saint Dominic, but continued to reside in her father's house, where she united a life of active charity to the prayer of a contemplative Saint. Our Lord bestowed on her His Heart in exchange for her own, gave her Communion with His own hands, and imprinted on her body the marks of His wounds.

From this obscure home the seraphic virgin was taken by Providence to defend the Church's cause. Her life became a continuing miracle. Armed with Papal authority and accompanied by three confessors, she traveled through Italy, reducing rebellious cities to the obedience of the Holy See, and winning hardened souls to God. In the sight of virtually the whole world she sought out Gregory XI at Avignon, brought him back to Rome, and by her letters to the kings and queens of Europe made good the Papal cause. She was the counselor of Urban VI, and sternly rebuked the disloyal cardinals who took part in electing an anti-pope.

Long had the holy virgin foretold the terrible schism which began before she died. Day and night she wept and prayed for unity and peace. But in spirit she saw the entire city of Rome full of demons, who were tempting the people to revolt and even to slay the Vicar of Christ. With intense earnestness Saint Catherine begged Our Lord to prevent this enormous crime. Their seditious temper was subdued by her prayers, but they vented their rage by scourging the Saint herself, who gladly endured all for God and His Church. She died in Rome in 1380, at the age of thirty-three.

Reflection. The seraphic Saint Catherine willingly sacrificed the delights of contemplation to labor for the Church and the Apostolic See. How deeply do the troubles of the Church and the consequent loss of souls afflict us? How often do we pray for the Church and the Pope?

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

This gem of a story has been “unpacked” by scholars of renown for all that Luke intended when he wrote it down. For a lesser light like myself I see in its structure the influence of Luke’s medical background. First of all, he presents a problem. Then comes an answer, or medicine. Finally there is a follow through and a recuperation of the patient. Allow me to illustrate.

First, the problem. Call it deep disappointment, or letdown. The two companions had witnessed Good Friday, and it left them more than melancholy. Their hopes seemed dashed for good. Their trust and aspirations vanished by Roman cruelty. So they are headed away from the scene, with an urgency to “get out of town.” Do we experience at least some portion of this experience when God seemingly lets us down?

Then comes the cure. And what a cure it is! Suddenly, so typical of Our Lord’s post resurrection appearances, He joins them on the road. When the men explain their long faces, He gives them a complete rationale for everything Jesus did, from Bethlehem to Calvary. Don’t you wish, as I do, that we could have heard all that from the God Man Himself? Anyhow, in our context, it was strong medicine rightly applied.

Finally, the recuperation. It began at that simple table at the roadside inn when Jesus broke the bread with them. Beautifully does Luke tell us how “their eyes were opened” and they recognized Him precisely in “the breaking of the bread.” In other words, the very holy Eucharist first celebrated Holy Thursday night and ever since then, in places high and humble ever since.

Note how the two travelers reverse course, or “make a U turn” as we might put it? With a certain spring in their steps they went right back to the huddled disciples to make their report. They were bursting with new-found faith and revived hope. Cured of confusion. Pledged to pursue a gospel-focused life.

We need this story right now. Unfortunately a lapse of faith has trampled all over the belief of so many of our fellow travelers. You see it in the empty pews on weekends. You hear it in their casual opinions about the place of Mass in their weekly agenda. You feel it in the loss of unity among families that used to gather at church on a Sunday morning.

Right at hand for easy blame is Covid. The shutdown of our churches during the pandemic and the ease of watching Mass on TV. An obvious happenstance I believe orchestrated by none less than Satan just like the clergy abuse scandal is. He hates the Eucharist because he hates God. And cleverly he goes about tearing down our faith and love of the good Lord who keeps giving it to us.

Even the devil knows that the Eucharist by nature is a communal affair. Our Lord’s chosen way of instituting this amazing gift was with a group of people around the table. Like any important celebration, there is nothing like being there. Our job as loyal followers is to wake others from their lethargy. To see Our Lord’s words “Do this in memory of Me” as the cure for so much that weighs them down. The counterfeit comfort that their chosen distractions offer. How sorely we need the Emmaus story. Thank you, Doctor St. Luke for giving it to us!
