A Catholic is obliged to confess serious sins in kind and number to a priest. If one is conscious of having committed serious sin, Confession ought to be made before receiving the Eucharist.

Baptism: Please call to arrange for your child's baptism before or soon after birth. A Godparent must be a Catholic in good standing.

Anointing of the Sick:

Please call for a priest to celebrate this Sacrament of Healing and Forgiveness for someone who is seriously ill or in danger of death. Do not wait until the sick person is unconscious.

Matrimony:

All Catholics ought to seek to have their marriage blessed by the Church so as to live in God's good graces & receive the Eucharist. Marriage cannot validly exist between baptized persons unless it is also a sacrament (Canon 1055.2). Contact a priest a year prior to the intended date of marriage to ensure proper preparation.

Confirmation: Need to complete your Sacraments of Initiation? Call Mrs. Kachnowski at 908-245-6572. She will help you prepare for confirmation. If they can do so without serious inconvenience, Catholics ought to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation before being admitted to marriage (Canon 1065).

RCIA: Desire baptism? Called to be a Catholic Christian? Contact Deacon David at 908-245-6572 and he will help you discern God's call to holiness.

o because you are lukewarm, and neither hot nor cold, I will spit you out of my mouth" (Rev 3:16).

There are four types of Christians: the Martyrs, the Confessors, the Lukewarm, and the Deniers. Of these four, two make it to heaven yet all have the possibility of making it to heaven by the grace of God.

The martyr is one who has given his life as a witness to the faith. The word martyr comes from the Greek for witness. It is the martyr who has given witness to the faith by the shedding of his blood. In Matthew's Gospel we hear: "Brother will betray brother to death, and a father his child; and children will rise up against parents and cause them to be put to death" (10:21), and again "Then they will deliver you to tribulation, and will kill you, and you will be hated by all nations because of My name" (24:9). And in today's Gospel Jesus declares, "Do not fear those who kill the body but are unable to kill the soul; but rather fear Him who is able to destroy both soul and body in hell" (Mt 10:28). Examples of the martyrs are the apostles, St. Philomena, St. Thomas More and more recently our Christian brothers and sisters being killed by ISIS and other Islamic extremists. There are also those who are known as white martyrs, that is, they suffered dearly for their faith in Jesus, but did not die. Perhaps they endured torture or imprisonment. Bishop Walsh of the Maryknoll Fathers lingered in prison in Red China for 12 years. He was denied even his Rosary beads.

The second type of Christian is the confessor. He or she is the one who has not died for the faith but has borne witness to the Catholic faith by his life. In a world that is against the Christian message of hope, forgiveness and love of neighbor, you and I must live as instruments of Christ's teachings and as Christ to others whose only exposure to the Gospel is what they see in you and me. Teachers bring the message to the next generation (e.g. The Sisters of Charity, catechists), health workers are the healing hands of Jesus, and parents are the first teachers of the faith to their children and the most important example to them of what it means to confess the faith in what we say and do. The notable confessors of the faith are the clergy led by their bishops and the Pope, the catechists and the theologians who confront heresy (e.g. St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Augustine), and the Christians leaders who employ the right judgment, prudence and other virtues to administer their God-given authority, like St. Louis of France and St. Margaret of Scotland.

The other Christian is the denier. The denier knows he is a Christian and believes in Jesus, but lives in fear rather than in hope. Out of fear, the denier will waiver when his faith is challenged. He or she is more concerned about the importance of this life over eternal life. He wants to please others at the detriment of pleasing God. Out of fear of death, persecution, hardship, loss of friendship and ostracization he denies Jesus so as to live and live more comfortably. Christ emphatically said, "Whoever denies me before others, I will deny before my heavenly Father" (MT 10:33) and elsewhere, "If anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself, and take up his cross and follow Me. For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it; but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." And this is where our hope lies. We can choose to reject the fear and take up the cross. St. Peter himself denied Jesus out of fear of persecution but he recognized Jesus' love and forgiveness and was able to put aside his fears and lose his life so that he can find it anew in Jesus. On the other hand Judas Iscariot betrayed Jesus but could not accept forgiveness and so he despaired, hung himself and suffered the consequences. Look to the words from the Book of Revelation and be courageous: "Do not fear what you are about to suffer. Behold, the devil is about to cast some of you into prison, so that you will be tested, and you will have tribulation for ten days. Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life" (2:10).

Then there are the lukewarm. "So because you are lukewarm, and neither hot nor cold, I will spit you out of my mouth" (Rev 3:16). Jesus speaks with tough love to those who are neither convicted nor against the faith. He sees that these people are most dangerous to the Gospel message. They will speak of

forgiveness but not forgive. They will be godfather to a child but dare not oppose the child or correct the child when he fails to live up to the norms of the Catholic teachings.

In the Catholic struggle for freedom in Mexico, the child martyr, St. José Luis Sanchez del Rio was taken by the Masons who imposed anticlerical laws. His godfather, the mayor of the town was a lukewarm Catholic. To save the boy he encouraged Jose to deny his faith in Jesus rather than encourage him to give his life for Christ. We all can easily fall into the lukewarm category if we are not careful to guard our faith in Jesus. Faith is precious and must be real and practiced daily. Like a weightlifter who must lift daily to stay toned, we must strengthen the muscle of faith each day or it will atrophy.

We must not be ashamed to bear witness to Christ in all we say and do. Each day we must trust in Jesus so that we will not fear to confess our faith in Jesus. And finally we must fear & respect only God; man can kill the body, but it is God who is our judge and can condemn the denier, the one who out of fear or respect of other people, denies Jesus.

From a sermon by Saint Anthony of Padua, priest (I, 226)

Actions speak louder than words

The man who is filled with the Holy Spirit speaks in different languages. These different languages are different ways of witnessing to Christ, such as humility, poverty, patience and obedience; we speak in those languages when we reveal in ourselves these virtues to others. Actions speak louder than words; let your words teach and your actions speak. We are full of words but empty of actions, and therefore are cursed by the Lord, since he himself cursed the fig tree when he found no fruit but only leaves. Gregory says: "A law is laid upon the preacher to practice what he preaches." It is useless for a man to flaunt his knowledge of the law if he undermines its teaching by his actions.

But the apostles spoke as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech. Happy the man whose words issue from the Holy Spirit and not from himself! For some men speak as their own character dictates, but steal the words of others and present them as their own and claim the credit for them. The Lord refers to such men and others like them in Jeremiah: So, then, I have a quarrel with the prophets that steal my words from each other. I have a quarrel with the prophets, says the Lord, who have only to move their tongues to utter oracles. I have a quarrel with the prophets who make prophecies out of lying dreams, who recount them and lead my people astray with their lies and their pretensions. I certainly never sent them or commissioned them, and they serve no good purpose for this people, says the Lord.



We should speak, then, as the Holy Spirit gives us the gift of speech. Our humble and sincere request to the Spirit for ourselves should be that we may bring the day of Pentecost to fulfillment, insofar as he infuses us with his grace, by using our bodily senses in a perfect manner and by keeping the commandments. Likewise we shall request that we may be filled with a keen sense of sorrow and with fiery tongues for confessing the faith, so that our deserved reward may be to stand in the blazing splendor of the saints and to look upon the triune God.

Our Feast of St. Anthony was a great success. It took many to come together and make it happen under the leadership of our Demeter, the Knights of Columbus, & the many volunteers And we give great that the many graces received and prayers of intercession.
